Keynote Speaker

Martha Albertson Fineman, Robert W. Woodruff Professor of Law, School of Law, Emory University, USA and director of The Vulnerability and the Human Condition Initiative.

Aim

This seminar will provide a forum for presentations and discussion on positive aspects of human vulnerability and the possibilities and implications for law of treating vulnerability as a condition that makes possible not only harm and suffering, but also flourishing. Particular attention will be paid to the implications of positive accounts of vulnerability for human rights, healthcare, family, and elder law.

Rationale

There has been significant critical engagement with the use of the principle of vulnerability in law. An extensive scholarly literature has been built-up that addresses whether vulnerability is best conceptualised as universal and/or particular, objective and/or subjective, inherent and/or situational, and requires empowerment and/or protection. There has been less critical engagement with the assumption that vulnerability means something like (universal and/or particular) exposure to harm, suffering, or exploitation. Most accounts of vulnerability are harm-based, and associate it with weakness and passivity. So conceived, vulnerability is usually presented in a negative light and is treated as a threat to flourishing and autonomy.

Yet an increasing number of legal theorists have challenged reductively negative accounts of the meaning and implications of vulnerability. These theorists have raised the possibility that vulnerability has positive dimensions and is a source of multiple forms of well-being.

This seminar brings together some of these theorists to explore more fully the implications and challenges for law of conceptualising vulnerability in a more positive manner.

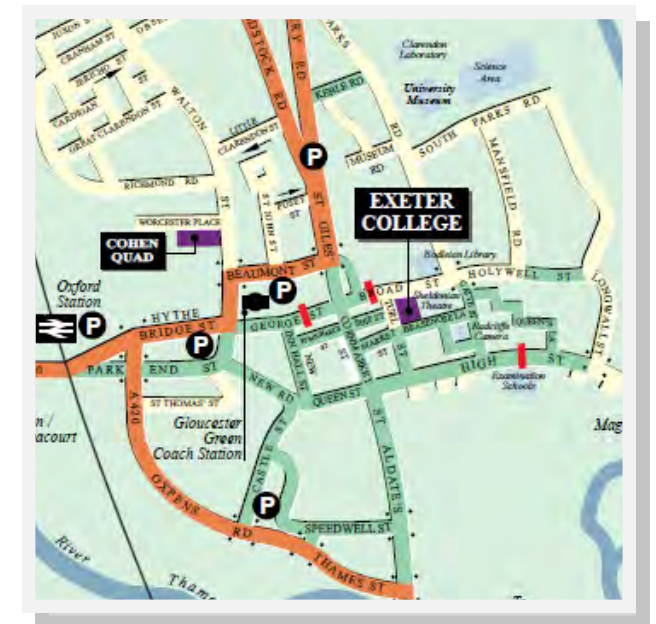
